A child's transition from foster to adoptive family is one of the most important events in a child's life. Yet the adults involved are often engaged in the complexities of trying to balance many needs of their own and the child welfare system. This training will focus on strategies to reorient the adoptive transition process to the attachment needs of the child. Many of these strategies may also be useful for transitions between foster placements or reunifications with birth families.

A Chuukese Resource Collection: Built for Children & Families

Did you know that Oregon has a growing Chuukese population? Chuuk State, comprised of multiple islands, is one of the four federated States of Micronesia.

ORPARC is pleased to successfully rise to the challenge to grow our resources to better fit the needs of Chuukese children and families working with children welfare. We now have not only a collection of Chuuk specific library books - both those about Chuuk and bilingual Chuukese, including a dictionary - but we have curated a group of cultural, artistic



and geographical resources that include legends, pictures, songs, and customs to help Chuukese children remain connected to their islands of origin. We also now have the All About Me book translated into Chuukese as well. We want to especially thank Dr. LJ Robert Rayphand for his masterpiece thesis *Túúttúnnapen Chuuk: Retelling Chuukese Stories in the Digital Age* that inspired ORPARC to dive into this project, and for his kindness in responding and sharing resources all the way from Chuuk. We leave you with one of his thought-provoking quotes from 2009:

"Every passing day is a history we left behind. Our days could be filled with either bad or good encounters, or may be a little bit of both. We always paint our yesterdays with black and white lines when they are bitter and sour. Happy days are drawn with colorful symbols highlighting fun and memories. 





What inspired your interest in TAC? As I engaged in my clinical practice, I remembered conversations with people who were adopted or in the foster system. I knew their experience had a certain uniqueness I wanted to support.

Any observations about your cohort? They were a wonderful group! It was amazing to get to know clinicians from all over the state. The ability to learn tips from each other and improve the clinician I am, was wonderful.

Why is this competency important? When I learned about trauma, foster adoption was often mentioned. Since I am dedicated to supporting children going through the process, I knew this was another area I needed to gain knowledge in. There is an increasing number of people who are directly or indirectly impacted by foster adoption. It's crucial I continue to educate myself to better support those I work with.


Noteworthy TAC takeaways? Clinicians are always willing to support one another in a myriad of ways. From the content, continue to focus on being client-centered and strength-based because the foster adoption journey is not linear. It allows for supporting people with a lot of imagination and creativity!

What are your other areas of expertise? I work with monolingual/bilingual Spanish-speaking clients, families, and young children. Collaborative problem-solving, mindfulness and yoga are also part of my supporting clients' needs.

Hopes for your growing practice? I wish to continue to grow my practice so there can be more clinicians of diverse backgrounds, different languages and skills for the children and families that need therapeutic support.

A Home Within (AHW): Volunteer Therapists Needed! By Laura Orgel, PhD

Youth in foster care often get transferred from one therapist to the next just as they are beginning to build a little trust. Most have already experienced many losses and unwelcome transitions. They need continuity, not more disruptions. AHW's mission is to meet this need. We provide foster- and former foster youth with longer-term, deeper, and more transformative therapy than is usually available to them. We do this by recruiting licensed, private practice therapists who commit to seeing one client, pro bono, for as long as it takes.

In return, therapists get immense satisfaction from earning the trust of a vulnerable young person, watching them get to know themselves in new ways, and seeing them grow stronger and better able to meet the challenges they face.

AHW therapists join a vibrant, national community of like-minded therapists with access to a wide range of free training, including regular online CE programs. They join a professionally led Consultation Group, where they get help and inspiration when cases get tough. Local gatherings help them feel connected and expand their professional networks.

I've been a volunteer with A Home Within since 2009, and Portland's Clinical Director since 2015. I'm still in touch with my first long-term AHW client, who was 12 when we started working together. After 15 years in state custody, she is now married, a homeowner, and a manager at a business she believes in. We get together sometimes to catch up, and to reminisce about all the changes she's been through. Because, as she put it, I'm "the only other person who remembers all those things!"
