Professional Materials

Material Title: **ADHD in Adolescents: Diagnosis and Treatment**

Author: Arthur Robin *Books* 1998 435 pages

This book, written for "psychologists, physicians, social workers, educators, and other professionals," is about, not only the facts of the disorder, but also its nature and the proper means of clinically evaluating it. And just as important, if not more so, he tells professionals what to do to be of help to these youth, their families, and their educators.

Material Title: **Adoption and Disruption: Rates, Risks, and Responses**

Author: Marianne Berry and Richard P. Barth *Books* 1988 220 pages

This book analyzes the personal and social economy values of adoption and the changing characteristics of adoptive children and families, while providing models of psychosocial adjustment to adoption. The implications for child welfare policy and services are explored in depth with special attention to methods for identifying risk factors and to strategies for maintaining adoptions that have been identified as at-risk for disruption.

Material Title: **Adoption and Healing: Proceedings of the international conference on Adoption and Healing**

Author: New Zealand Adoption and Healing Trust *Books* 1997 352 pages

Until perhaps the 1970s, adoption was generally regarded in Western countries as beneficial to all parties involved. It was seen as a one-off event, after which life for the adopting family was assumed to carry on as normal. Over the past 20 years, this attitude has altered significantly. It has become obvious that adoption is a lifelong process. Although many adoptions have benefited those involved, others, notably some birth mothers and adopted people, have experienced a range of psychological and emotional problems. Some of these problems have commonalities with known areas of treatment, some may require a specific and different approach. This book contains papers presented to an international conference held in June 1997 in Wellington, Aotearoa New Zealand on issues resulting from the adoption experience. The authors include many of the leading professional authorities in the adoption field from Holland, the U.S., the U.K., and Australia, as well as New Zealand.

Material Title: **Adoption and Prenatal Alcohol and Drug Exposure: Research, Policy, and Practice**

Author: Richard P. Barth *Books* 2000 281 pages

This book contains ten extensive essays from a number of experts in the field. It is organized into three major sections: Research on prenatal alcohol and drug exposure and its implications for adoption; programmatic approaches and practice considerations related to serving substance-exposed children and their adoptive families; and policy issues that bear on adoption planning and services for this vulnerable group of children. It is designed as a resource for practitioners, policymakers, researchers, and others with an interest in adoption.

Material Title: **Adoption and the Family System**

Author: Miriam Reitz, PhD, and Kenneth W. Watson *Books* 1992 320 pages

The authors utilize family systems theory to construct a practical treatment approach for working with families on the myriad issues and interrelationships that surround adoption. The model described is broadly inclusive of all families linked by the adoption triangle. This book offers an entirely new approach to evaluation and treatment designed specifically for families linked in adoption.

Material Title: **Adoption Nation: How the Adoption Revolution Is Transforming America**

Author: Adam Pertman *Books* 2000 312 pages

Pertman, an adoptive father and former journalist for The Boston Globe, combines research and personal anecdotes in this overview of the trends and cultural ramifications of adoption. His views: families should be "out" about their adoptive status; children should be told they were adopted as early as possible; all members of the adoption "triad" (birth parents, child and adoptive parents) should try to stay in close communication; and much more.

Material Title: **Adoption Resources for Mental Health Professionals**

Author: Pamela Grabe *Books* 1990 348 pages

This revised edition is a valuable resource for professionals who find their diagnoses, assessment, and counseling of foster children misleading because they employ criteria based on experiences of non-adoptive children. The 23 contributors include professionals with extensive teaching and practical experience in the field.

Material Title: **After Adoption: A Manual for Professionals Working With Adoptive Families**
Author: J.P. Bourguignon, Jean-Pierre and Watson *Books* 1987 60 pages

Aimed primarily toward mental health professionals who work with adoptees and their families, this manual addresses the differences between adoptive and biological families, identifies needs of adoptive families, and discusses diagnostic assessment of families following placement and factors to be considered in planning therapeutic intervention.

Material Title: **After Adoption: The Needs of Adopted Youth**
Author: Jeanne A. Howard and Susan Livingston Smith *Books* 2003 139 pages

The authors examine more than 1,000 adoptive families to find out how they are functioning years after the adoption. They analyze risk and resiliency factors associated with adjustment and examine differences in adoptions by kin, foster parents, and those matched with children for the purpose of adoption. "After Adoption" will help child welfare professionals to develop post adoption services to sustain and strengthen adoptive families and to better prepare parents and children for adoption.

Material Title: **After Loss: Parenting in the Next Pregnancy, A Manual for Professionals Working with Families in Pregnancy Following Loss**
Author: Joann O'Leary, Lynnda Parker, and Clare Thorwick *Books* 1998 108 pages

"The purpose of this manual is to suggest a new framework to consider the behaviors of parents in a pregnancy subsequent to a loss. We believe their anxiety, fear and renewed grief are all normal. Concepts are based on the work of psychological theorists, nurses, infant mental health specialists and have been refined through the clinical observations of hundreds of families in our practice." -- from preface

Material Title: **An Activity-Based Approach to Developing Young Children's Social Emotional Competence**
Author: Jane Squires and Diane Bricker *Books* 2007 ges + 1 CD

From the creators of ASQ and ASQ:SE, this practical guidebook gives non-mental health professionals exactly what they need: a ready-to-use, start-to-finish linked system for identifying concerns and improving young children's social-emotional health. This book walks readers through the five-step intervention process called Activity-Based Intervention: Social Emotional (ABI:SE).

Material Title: **Assessing a Family's Ability to Adopt Transracially (DVD)**
Author: Dr. Joseph Crumbley *DVDs* 36 minutes

This video provides techniques for assessing adoptive parents' experience and understanding with regard to the role of race and ethnic heritage; a family's motivation and support systems; the family's ability to provide a community and opportunities for same-race role models and peer relationships, and life-styles and parenting abilities.

This booklet will help parents and professionals examine the process of attachment, the needs of children related to attachment, the behaviors that indicate the presence or absence of attachments, and ways to develop attachments.

Material Title: **Attachment Disorganization**
Author: Judith Solomon and Carol George *Books* 1999 420 pages

Since 1986, when disorganized attachment was first defined by Mary Main and Judith Solomon, a great deal of interest has been shown in this addition to the standard Ainsworth classification system. This groundbreaking volume brings together eminent researchers and clinicians to present current, original theory and data on the nature of disorganized attachment, its etiology, and its sequelae. Contributors report on the social, psychological, and biological contributions to disorganization. Longitudinal findings are presented on developmental outcomes in middle childhood; special populations are examined, including children with disabilities; and new assessment methodologies are described. Advancing our understanding of a significant subgroup of infants and children with attachment-related difficulties, the volume represents an important contribution to the empirical attachment literature.

Explores the experience of being a new leader in an infant-family program. This book describes how to use self-awareness, observation, and flexible responses to manage stress and increase on-the-job effectiveness. Leadership issues, including individualizing one's relationships with staff members and encouraging collegial work, are also discussed.

They are able to identify an extended support system and address common goals and concerns as Christina approaches adulthood.

Each year, approximately one in 25 U.S. children is reported as a victim of prenatal substance abuse, criminal neglect, or physical or emotional violence, and child-protection agencies are overwhelmed by the crisis. Filmed on location in Baltimore, Atlanta, Houston, and Seattle, this program narrated by Susan Sarandon examines the cycle of child abuse. Case studies include children with developmental difficulties caused by maternal drug addiction, post-traumatic stress disorder brought on by scenes of extreme violence in the home, and life-threatening injuries from beatings.

Material Title: **Building Strong Foundations: Practical Guidance for Promoting the Social-Emotional Development of Infants and Toddlers**

Author: Rebecca Parlakian and Nancy L. Seibel *Books* 2002 26 pages

This book explores how supportive relationships at all levels of an infant-family program (supervisor and staff, staff and family, parent and child) contribute to children's healthy social-emotional development (infant mental health). The authors present the core concepts of infant mental health, offer strategies that leaders and trainers can use to promote children's mental health, and describe guidelines for referring very young children for assessment and treatment. This publication offers numerous vignettes featuring a mix of infant-family settings and exercises designed to help staff and leaders better understand and apply infant mental health practices.

Material Title: **Case Studies in Infant Mental Health: Risk, Resiliency, and Relationships**
Author: Joan J. Shirilla and Deborah J. Weatherson *Books* 2002 203 pages

Offers 12 real-life stories written by infant mental health specialists about their work with young children and families. Each case study also reveals the supervision and consultation that supported the specialist, and the specialist's interaction with the larger service system.

This entry from the Allyn and Bacon Casebook Series is intended for therapists and students studying to become therapists. It begins with a chapter that introduces a "Multi-Systemic Approach to Practice" followed by four chapters, each of which walks the student through an actual case with questions for the student to answer and commentary every step of the way.

Material Title: **Children's Adjustment to Adoption: Developmental and Clinical Issues**
Author: David M. Brodzinsky *Books* 1998 116 pages

This book presents major issues that affect both the process and outcome of adoption for children and their parents. It offers extensive coverage of theory and research on children and families with clinical vignettes punctuating key points. A discussion of intervention and assessment issues that commonly arise in work with adoptees closes this volume.

Material Title: **Child's Journey Through Placement, A**

This book provides a foundation of resources and tools to help professionals and parents support children as they move through the foster care system to adoption. At times it can focus on theory and practice but it helps families understand why kids move and how their moves affect them. This is considered a seminal work in the field containing practical and thoughtful information about special needs children. More current material on new neurological research and brain development was not available at the time this was written. However, this is still a valuable resource with insight on various aspects related to foster and adopted children.

Material Title: **Circle of Security Intervention, The: Enhancing Attachment in Early Parent-Child Relationships**

Author: Bert Powell, Glen Cooper, Kent Hoffman, and Bob Marvin

Presenting both a theoretical foundation and proven strategies for helping caregivers become more attuned and responsive to their young children's emotional needs (ages 0-5), this is the first comprehensive presentation of the Circle of Security (COS) intervention. The book lucidly explains the conceptual underpinnings of COS and demonstrates the innovative attachment-based assessment and intervention strategies in rich clinical detail, including three chapter-length case examples. COS is an effective research-based program that has been implemented throughout the world with children and parents experiencing attachment difficulties.

Material Title: **Clinical and Practice Issues in Adoption: Bridging the Gap Between Adoptees Placed as Infants and as Older Children**

This book is intended for all those affected by and interested in adoption. The contents are written by a variety of experts in the adoption field and examine topics such as treatment issues for adoptees placed at different ages, search and reunion, ethics, infertility, shared identity issues, and the ongoing need for adoption support.

Beginning with a review of the ecological and sociopolitical factors that influence a child's world, the authors scrutinize typical early intervention environments such as homes, child care centers, and public schools. Based on their collective observations, they proceed to explore the influence that familial, economic, and cultural systems have on program outcomes.

Its illustrative case studies and historical perspective make this text ideal for in-service use. Scholarly as well as practical, Context of Early Intervention is an important professional development tool for improving early intervention programming today and envisioning a model system of service provision for tomorrow.

Material Title: **Diagnosis and Treatment of Feeding Disorders in Infants, Toddlers, and Young Children**

Author: Irene Chatoor, MD *Books* 2009 141 pages

Delays in development, as well as in growth, can occur when a feeding disorder arises. Irene Chatoor, MD, a world-renowned specialist in feeding disorders at Children's National Medical Center in Washington, DC, offers clinical guidelines for comprehensive diagnosis and treatment of feeding disorders in infants and toddlers. Grounded in the latest research and contemporary practice, the author discusses the consequences of early feeding problems and reviews relevant terminology, etiological factors, and how to distinguish serious feeding disorders from transient and milder feeding difficulties. The book also includes Parent Information Outlines about the feeding disorders.

Material Title: **Diagnostic Conundrums (2 CDs)**

Presented by John Sobraske, adoption psychotherapist, New York at the 37th NACAC Conference 2011 in Denver, Colorado. Rather than describing specific diagnoses, this session looks at the issue of diagnosis in general. The speaker will cover the use and misuse of labels, such as bipolar and reactive attachment disorder, and the need to understand how various influences interact (like developmental delays, identity issues, and chemical exposure in utero) and to determine, in individual cases, which factors are salient and which are not. Finally, the session will help parents become expert advocates who maintain a whole picture of their child and resist diagnostic fragmentation by specialists.

Material Title: **Diagnostic Interviewing of the Misbehaving Child**

Author: John Taylor *Books* 1989 42 pages

This booklet is intended as a guide for school counselors and mental health professionals to use in analyzing misbehavior patterns in children. Included is a section on ways to gather pertinent information from parents, a description of pathological patterns that can occur between parents, a variety of interviewing strategies to use with children, and suggestions for assessing the relationships between children and adults and children with each other.

Material Title: **Domestic Violence and Childhood Trauma (DVD)**

This video examines how abused children often become involved later in destructive and problematic adult relationships. In some cases the adult who was abused in childhood becomes a victim again in adult relationships, in other cases they may become the perpetrator of domestic violence. Practitioners from a variety of disciplines will gain an understanding of the impact of violence and will discover concrete intervention strategies to address the consequences of this experience for young children.

Material Title: **Early Childhood Mental Health Consultation**

Author: Elena Cohen and Roxane Kaufmann *Books* April 2000 44 pages

This monograph builds upon a two-day roundtable meeting that was funded by the Special Program Development Branch, Center for Mental Health Services, Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration. The meeting brought together key stakeholders from the early education and child care fields with family members, mental health practitioners and administrators, and federal, state, and community agency representatives to share their state-of-the-art thinking on promoting healthy development among infants, toddlers, and preschool-age children, in early childhood settings through mental health consultation. The monograph describes an early childhood mental health perspective, defines types of mental health consultation, and provides examples of the essential features of consultation, including challenges and strategies in the consulting process. A vignette illustrates the nuances of the process, and descriptions of programs implementing early childhood mental health consultation are included.

Material Title: **Emancipated Youth Connections Project: Permanency Stories (DVD)**

This video shares participants' experiences through the 2008 project, "Emancipated Youth Connections Projects." The purpose of the project was to develop a model of service to find permanency for 20 young adults (ranging in age from 17-39 years) who had left the foster care system without having permanent and unconditional lifelong connections to at least one adult. Many participants lost contact with siblings. Each participant was supported to make connections and reach out to birth family or other who are important to them. Each one had a unique experience with the process. A toolkit was developed as a result for this project and is available through the SENECA website.

Material Title: **Empowering Children to Cope With Difficulty and Build Muscles for Mental Health**

Providing a conceptual understanding and practical suggestions for educating children in skills that can promote their mental health, this text presents principles for effective delivery of suggested intervention techniques. Chapters in the first section of the text focus on helping children to deal with problem situations. The second section provides information to promote emotionally healthy children, including a knowledge of self, a respect for self and others, healthy habit strength, and a balance between work and play. Suggestions are also provided for enhancing intervention efforts and principles proven effective in mental health education.

Regain your spark of purpose. Word by word, renew your wholeness, your humanity, and your vital health. Take a dose daily. Today most children entering the child welfare system are very young, and, in most large states, infants are the largest group of children entering foster care each year. Social service systems are typically not designed for very young children, however, and therefore fail to serve their special needs. This shortcoming is significant because protecting very young children from physical harm is not enough; they must also be protected from developmental harm.

The *Tender Years* is the first textbook to address this critical situation. Beginning with an overview of child development theory, it examines child abuse reporting patterns and discusses placement in foster care, reunification, and adoption. It also looks at public child welfare practice, featuring vivid examples of the children and families served by this system. But we also have to look at the blowing up process, which is often the pain and rage caused by childhood trauma."

This program also features interviews with Vickie, Cynthia, and Curtis, adults recovering from childhood trauma. Curtis, for example, is battling addiction and is beginning to explore the connections between a violent childhood and his current substance-abuse problems. Recovery from childhood trauma ultimately depends on accepting and understanding the original trauma, and then relying on the same survival skills that one had as a child.
